Our History

Harris County Department of Education, or HCDE, is a separate and distinct entity from county agencies of Harris County, Texas. The Department's primary service area, geographically, covers 1,788 square miles. We offer services to 25 rural, suburban and urban school districts located either entirely or partially within Harris County; to neighboring school districts and governmental agencies in surrounding counties; and to schools, education services centers and other governmental agencies statewide.

In January 1999, HCDE became a Head Start grantee. Our Head Start service area covers approximately 600 square miles of the northeast and southeast portions of Harris County. Our boundaries extend north to Humble and Huffman. The eastern board of HCDE service delivery includes Crosby, Baytown and LaPorte. To the south, the area east of I-45 includes Clear Creek, Pasadena and Deer Park. We operate 16 campuses which are strategically located to serve over 1,250 students. Within the Early Child Care Partnership, we serve 60 additional students at seven community child care campuses in our service area.

I hope you enjoy our story as much as we enjoy sharing it with you. We're HCDE...See the Impact as we continue our journey!



Lessons through Songs, Stories, and Activities that Empower Students and Parents

Students enrolled in our Head Start and Early Head Start programs are exposed to a variety of learning opportunities using the Frog Street Infant, Toddler, and Prekindergarten curriculums. These comprehensive curriculums assist staff with empowering parents to be equal partners in their student's education while boosting language and literacy skills through songs, stories and other activities. The curriculum also enables teaching staff to enhance students' abilities while building on concepts and skills.

Students learn at their own pace with the Frog Street curriculums through individualization, small groups, and whole group experiences which create chances for students to engage in purposeful and meaningful differentiated instruction. There is a strong emphasis placed on social and emotional development which prepares students for daily interactions with peers and adults. Data shows our students' knowledge and skills have flourished with the use of the Frog Street Curriculum.

Overall Assessment of 2018-2019 Ongoing Assessment

During the 2018-2019 school year, students were assessed during the beginning-of-year (BOY), middle-of-year (MOY) and end-of-year (EOY) assessment points. The Physical Development & Health and Social & Emotional Development assessments were only conducted in English.

Here are some observations:

- · End-of-year scores were greater than beginning-of-year scores for both 3 and 4-year old.
- · Bilingual 3 and 4-year old students had gains in both Spanish and English assessments.

· Students who were assessed in both English and Spanish assessments also showed a better performance on the English EOY assessment which shows that those students' acquisition of the English vocabulary improved over the course of the 2018–2019 school year.



20-Year Tradition Helping Families Continues

Family, friends, coworkers and local businesses once again rallied behind Bates Collision Centers to give two Head Start families their own vehicle for HCDE Head Start's annual Responsible Parenting Award. Now in its 20th year, the tradition of helping families become more independent by providing reliable transportation has become a highlight of the year for employees, according to Leila Bates, who co-owns the business with husband Lee. Bates Collision Centers has locations in Channelview and Baytown.



Employees ensured the vehicles – a 2009 Ford Focus and a 2008 Buick LaCrosse – were in great shape, AMI Insurance donated car insurance. La Porte Automotive gave a tune-up, and there were donations of gas cards and gifts for the families. Then there was the gift-wrapping party to put everything together.

"The whole thing brings employees, friends and family together," Bates said. "Our employees really buy into this."

Of course, the Bates' also take great pleasure and pride in helping Head Start families get ahead. The couple has donated a total of 36 vehicles since the award was started.

In December, Fifth Ward mom Sheena Gulley was presented with the Ford Focus at the Channelview location while Parishellia Banks, a teacher assistant at Let's Learn Christian Learning Center in Baytown, received the Buick LaCrosse in Baytown.

"Both of them are working so hard to do what's best for their families," Bates said.



Gulley is a single mom of four children who works full-time at Walmart and has been reliant on Metro and Uber. Having a car of her own will allow her to attend her children's school functions, have a stress-free journey to and from work, and start college.







Banks, who at 56 is on her third round of parenting – she is looking after her late niece's two-year-old son Jayce, said a car will make it easier to get around and give her more independence.

"The vehicle means I can go on errands, go to and from work easily and take Jayce to the park," Banks said.



FAMILY SUCCESS STORY: JOHNNIE JONES

Head Start Career and Family Success for Teacher and Daughter

Growing up, many teens volunteer their spare time helping younger children at a neighborhood center. This is what current Baytown Early Head Start teacher Johnnie Jones did as a teenager and realized that she wanted to work with children when she grew up.

"I became interested in working with the Head Start program after volunteering with a group of young



children at a local recreation center when I was a teenager," she said. "It was at that time that I realized I had a natural ability to engage and teach young children."

Jones considers working with children more than a vocation, it's a calling.

"This is what I was born to do, to teach young children," she said.

In 1991 Jones became a teacher for Head Start and joined Harris County Department of Education Head Start in 1999. She has spent her time with HCDE Head Start at the Baytown and La Porte campuses.

She had four children and the youngest couldn't relate much with her older siblings at home. The Head Start program was an asset in this regard.

"I wanted my daughter to be a part of the Head Start program because I knew it could help me with the overall, especially social and emotional, development for her," she said. "Her needs were eventually met and she made many new friends." With the help of her daughter's teachers to make learning fun and engaging, she progressed socially, emotionally and academically. Because of her Head Start experience, she excelled as she got older in school.

"I always received positive feedback from many of my daughter's teachers throughout her school years," Jones said. "She always exhibited a keen desire to learned, had great study habits and applied herself to her homework with dedication to do her best."

She believes Head Start had an impact on her daughter while growing up.

"I believe Head Start, my daughter's dedication and her attitude towards her students, and my attitude towards education had a very positive impact on my daughter," Jones said.

Although her daughter has been out of the Head Start program for more than 10 years, Jones has many fond, positive experiences.

"I have told her about the friends she made and the fun learning she did when she attended Head Start," Jones said. "As a matter of fact, one of her Head Start teachers still calls and inquires about Izihrie to this day."

Izihrie is now 18 and attending the University of Houston Main Campus. During her junior and senior year of high school, she attended San Jacinto College Central Campus and received her associate degree. Izihrie graduated high school with a 5.2 grade point average and in the top 10 percent of her class of 500.





PARENT SUCCESS STORY: CHARLOTTE JACKSON

Former Head Start Parents Shares her Family Success, Involvement

When former Head Start parent, Charlotte Jackson was growing up the program was "new" and the community had the mistaken belief that it was only for minorities.

"By the time I became a single parent, I had learned to dig for resources to help my children succeed." she said.

Two of three Jackson's children attended Head Start program. While not part of the Harris County Department of Education Head Start Program, they attended the Sheffield campus in east Houston from 1994-1997.



"Although Sheffield was not part of HCDE at the time, the basis of the program was the same," she said.

Many single-parent families are unable to afford childcare because of high costs and limited income.

"I could not afford to put them into day care," Jackson said. "I recognized that they were very bright and needed to be challenged more than just be in a day care. The structured programs at Head Start were a blessing."

Her son and daughter, Daniel and Laura, both became independent thinkers early on.

"They learned the importance of cooperation as well as that of learning," she said.

Jackson knew by having her children attend Head Start that they would succeed later in life.

"Both of my children were always at the top of their classes when they were in school," she said. "Daniel participated in the Gifted and Talented (GT) program when he was in the third grade. He ended up graduating early with college credits. Laura was also in dual credit college classes and after graduating from high school she enlisted in the US Army." Today, both Daniel, 28, and Laura, 27, are college

Today, both Daniel, 28, and Laura, 27, are college graduates who are self-supporting themselves.

She believes that if Head Start was not around that her children would have had challenges with learning and social skills while in school.

"It would have been very difficult for them," Jackson said. "They built friendships while they were at Sheffield that are still in place today."

Head Start was not only beneficial for Jackson's children, but also to her. She was given the opportunity to be involved with the program and recognized the need to give back.

"Through the years, I have been blessed to volunteer with HCDE Head Start and help provide speakers, events and resources," she said.

HCDE Head Start also partners with San Jacinto College and has a Head Start campus at its north campus in the North Shore area. When this partnership developed, Jackson was employee at the college.

"I have spoken to many parent groups and been able to share as a former Head Start parent about the importance of being involved, how to look for resources and share them with families," she said. "As a San Jac employee, I

was able to share my Head Start experience with administrators as well as students and the community." Provider Olga Hernandez helped Romero and her family with resources as they did not receive support from FEMA.



"I am very appreciative of the help we received from churches and food pantries to get back in our home," Romero said.

Although life is still a struggle to get back to normalcy to this day, she says things are gradually getting better.

HCDE Head Start Leads to Bigger Dreams for Teaching Assistant

Before getting a job at Harris County Department Head Start, Tawana Jackson had the desire to pursue a teaching career.

"I heard that HCDE was a program that I would be able to succeed in for years," she said.

When she was hired in August 2009, she began her career as a teaching assistant at Compton Head Start. After 10 years there she moved on to the Coolwood Head Start campus. Prior to coming to HCDE, she worked at the Cathedral House Montessori School.

As a teaching assistant for Head Start she helps the lead teacher in the classroom, teach the students valuable life skills, filing paperwork, assist with lesson planning and if the lead teacher is absent she fills in for that role for the day.

Being around the students each day helps life Jackson's spirits even if she is having a tough day.

"I absolutely love my children," she said. "Even when I'm not feeling well, they lift up my spirits."

The staff is also a highlight of her day with their encouragement.

"The Coolwood staff is awesome and I love working with them, too," Jackson said.

Working for HCDE also added perks for Jackson. She can have weekends and holidays off and because she works at a Head Start center, she also has the summers as they follow a school district calendar.

As with every job there will always be challenges and will find a way to get through them. Jackson had a student who was autistic, and this was her first time working with one. She was the lead teacher at the time as the teacher she was covering for was out on maternity leave.

"I had to use strategies from my manager and the lead teacher to figure out how to speak to him and learn how to teach to him in a different way," Jackson said.

All her hard work in the classroom didn't go unnoticed by her fellow coworkers because she was named teacher of the year.

In her spare time, she has gone back to school to finish up the last few classes to get her associate degree and become a teacher at the Coolwood campus.

"I want to be a better person and do the best I can do my students, their families and my coworkers," Jackson said.

Parents commend financial literacy classes

Parents are changing their spending habits since attending a financial literacy course, introduced earlier this year at all 15 centers through HCDE Head Start's partnership with a number of banks and independent financial advisers.

"They helped me sort out my priorities and where I could save money," said Coolwood parent Maria Reyes Serrato.

Serrato was able to find cheaper health insurance and has started a monthly savings plan after attending the classes conducted by Kenneth Maldonado, an independent financial representative.

Barrett Station parent Justin Chenevert realized his family was spending too much money eating out. He said they now cook more at home, and though he isn't working right now, they are saving a small amount each week.

"We are trying to change our habits bit by bit," Chenevert said.

Both parents said the three part course, the goal of which was to promote financial literacy to Head Start families, provided a fresh outlook and much needed information about prioritizing spending, budgeting and saving. The classes were conducted by representatives from BBVA Compass Bank, Prosperity Bank, Frost Bank and Beacon Credit Union and independent advisers,

Jose De La Rosa an independent adviser and a Workplace Solutions with BBVA Compass Bank who conducted classes at JD walker, Barrett Station, Tidwell, Baytown, Dogan and La Porte, found there was a real need for this kind of course. The first class covered budgeting; the second was about managing debt; and the third about savings.

"The first two classes are big ones," De La Rosa said. "When you really start looking at your budget you realize what your wants and needs are."

He said it's about prioritizing wants and needs, managing expectations and trying to budget accordingly. He said it's too easy to get into debt and managing debt effectively is vital.


"For instance, say you want different channels on your television, if you are looking to make some savings you have to think about budgeting for that," De La Rosa said.


