Harris County Department of Education, or HCDE, is a separate and distinct entity from county agencies of Harris County, Texas. The Department's primary service area, geographically, covers 1,788 square miles. We offer services to 25 rural, suburban and urban school districts located either entirely or partially within Harris County; to neighboring school districts and governmental agencies in surrounding counties; and to schools, education service centers and other governmental agencies statewide.

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In January 1999, HCDE became a Head Start grantee. Our Head Start service area covers approximately 600 square miles of the northeast and southeast portions of Harris County. Our boundaries extend north to Humble and Huffman. The eastern boundary of HCDE service delivery includes Crosby, Baytown and LaPorte. To the south, the area east of I-45 includes Clear Creek, Pasadena and Deer Park. We operate 16 centers which are strategically located to serve over 1,250 children. Within the Early Child Care Partnership, we serve 60 additional children at seven community child care centers in our service area.

#### Lessons through Songs, Stories, Activities Empower Children and Parents

Our official birth to 5 curricula called Frog Street Infant, Frog Street Toddler, and Frog Street Pre-K empower parents as equal partners in their children's education. These comprehensive curricula boost language through songs, stories and other activities. Children learn at their own pace with Frog Street.

We have seen our children bloom and grow with the Frog Street Curriculum. Frog Street allows teaching staff to serve a range of abilities while building on concepts and skills. Emphasis is placed on social and emotional development. A robust vocabulary is supplied.

#### **Overall Assessment of 2015-2016**

#### **Ongoing Assessment**

Children are assessed at the beginning-of-year (BOY), middle-of-year (MOY), and end-of-year (EOY).

#### Here are some observations:

- End-of-year scores were greater than middle-of-year and beginning-of-year for all five domains of assessment.
- Scores for 4-year-old students were greater than 3-year-old students.
- In general, female performance was better than male performance.
- In general, English assessment results were better than Spanish assessment results, however results illustrate that our Spanish speaking students are increasing their English language acquisition.

# Alumni Success Story: Day'Zjah Pennywell

#### Day'Zjah Pennywell Discovers Love for Learning through Head Start

Growing up, Day'Zjah Pennywell was always sociable, but mother Tamika Ward noticed her daughter thrive after enrolling her in Head Start in 1999. Like many parents, Ward enrolled her daughter in the program so she could interact with other children her age and build an early foundation for education.

"I saw Head Start as a way for her to get ahead in learning," explained Ward. "I felt like the earlier she started, the better it would be for her when she got to public school."

Now a sophomore at Prairie View A&M on multiple athletic and academic scholarships, Pennywell continues to thrive in school, in part because of the early foundation she received in Head Start.

Head Start goes beyond providing children with academic and socialization skills they need before entering elementary school. Staff also work with families to provide financial, health, nutrition and parenting skills, which was valuable to Ward as a young mother.

After leaving Head Start in 2001, Pennywell entered the Gifted and Talented program at her district, was a straight "A" student and participated in various schoolrelated clubs and athletic activities for years. Most importantly, she developed a love for learning at an early age.

Ward still remembers Pennywell happily singing nursery rhymes as a child and never missing an opportunity to talk about what she learned in Head Start.

"She could also recognize colors, shapes and numbers when we were out and spoke a little Spanish because her teachers would teach in English and Spanish," Ward remembers. "I thought that was amazing."

When Pennywell finished a piece of work at Head Start that she was particularly proud of, Ward always made a point to display it in their home. This gave the whole family a chance to discuss the work together and was stimulating for Pennywell as a young learner. "It made me happy to see she was excited about learning," Ward said.

Pennywell carried that excitement for learning with her throughout her school career. She is currently majoring in criminal justice with a minor in nutrition, and she continues to utilize the foundational skills gained through Head Start.

# **Parent Success Story: Amanda Kastl**

#### Head Start Grandparent Finds Support System at La Porte Center

HCDE's Head Start program goes beyond early education and provides families with the additional health, nutrition and financial support they need to thrive. As the grandparent and guardian to 4-year-old Rayne, Amanda Kastl is one of many whose life was changed through Head Start services.

Kastl gained custody of Rayne when she was only 5 months old. During that time, Kastl was also taking care of her sick father while her husband was undergoing chemotherapy. For much of that time, Kastl wasn't able to work and became isolated.

When Rayne turned 3, Kastl enrolled her at the La Porte Head Start Center, remembering her daughter attended the program many years ago.



"At that point, I was basically a recluse. The Head Start staff got me back on my feet and gave me the opportunity to get involved with the parent committee and Policy Council to give back where I could," said Kastl.

Through encouragement from the staff, Kastl became an active volunteer at the center and helped in classrooms, worked in the school's garden and secured donations from area businesses for family activities. She was also integral in creating a safer experience for La Porte students while at school.

After recognizing that the small, two-lane road in front of the center was unsafe for families to drop off and pick up students, she worked with city officials to install school zone and "No Parking" signs, and to convert the road into a one-way thoroughfare to decrease hazardous traffic.

After a year at the center, Kastl lost her mother, two brothers and niece. She was still involved at the center, so the La Porte staff became a support system and helped her through her most challenging times. They even guided her through the steps to get her Texas Realtor's license when she was struggling emotionally.

"I was maxed out emotionally," said Kastl, "but the family service providers at La Porte helped me set goals, stay on track and provided support when I needed it most."

Kastl now works as a realtor full-time, but still finds time to volunteer and show how grateful she is for the center that made it all possible. "Head Start services literally saved our lives. When Rayne came here she gained socialization skills, she's learning to read, write and count, and she knows how to interact with others. I was also able to get involved in the community again." –Amanda Kastl

Kastl added that although every family won't go through the same experiences she did, every family can benefit from the stability, nutrition, early education and caring support Head Start provides.

"I believe if you touch a child's life at an early age like this Head Start does, it will make a difference later on."

# **Staff Spotlight**

#### HCDE Spotlight: Employee Ross-Daniel Collaborates with Community to Benefit Head Start Students

As a mother of four daughters, grandmother of two and manager of the Head Start Compton Center, Merevonna Ross-Daniel is no stranger to a busy schedule. Since the Compton Head Start program is housed in the Northeast Multi-Service Center in Houston, Ross-Daniel has the unique experience of

collaborating with city employees and local seniors who attend programs at the community center, in addition to managing her 25 employees and 131 students.

"I believe the more involvement, love, support and guidance a child receives, the more likely they are to be successful in life." –Merevonna Ross-Daniel

"I enjoy collaborating with the community center to ensure our families are getting a positive, engaging and effective learning environment for their students," says Ross-Daniel.

Some of the ways the community center gets involved with Head Start is through the garden program and field day. Local seniors at the community center read to Compton students and assist with their four on-site gardens. Since staff of Tidwell Park are located in the community center, the students participate in a field and game day with assistance from the recreation staff providing engagement and involvement from the community.

"I believe the more involvement, love, support and guidance a child receives, the more likely they are to be successful in life," says Ross-Daniel. "That's what we provide at Compton."

Ross-Daniel first found her calling for Head Start while taking classes at San Jacinto College North. Her Child

Development professor informed her of an upcoming Head Start Job Fair, and since 2001 she has been making a daily impact on children and families in the Head Start program.

Throughout her career, she has served as a teaching assistant, teacher, assistant center manager and center manager at multiple Head Start centers. She has been center manager at Compton since July 2015.

Even though Ross-Daniel isn't in the classroom fulltime anymore, she loves being able to interact with the students on a daily basis. She considers herself blessed to see the development of students in the Head Start program and contribute to their growth. She recalls a young girl, 3, who began the 2015-16 school year unable to speak.

"When she first came to the program, she was not vocal and would only point to things in the classroom," Ross-Daniel recalls. "With the help of our Compton teachers, she is now saying words and interacting with other children and staff."

Collaborating with multiple organizations within the community center can be a tiresome job, but Ross-Daniel has a strong support system to lean on. As a mother and grandmother, she spends her downtime with family, doing activities they enjoy such as camping, shopping and participating in Girl Scouts.
